INTRODUCTION

For years I've been using our 'I Don't Have Enough Faith to Be an Atheist' book (co-authored with Dr. Norman Geisler) to teach and develop curriculum for teenagers and adults that provides the evidence for Christianity in an orderly and understandable way. We've never had something that does that for kids until now.

I've teamed up with Ms. Hanna Sims to write this curriculum. <u>Its purpose is to help kids have</u> <u>confidence that Christianity is true by studying different types of evidence</u> (logical, scientific, historical, etc.) <u>that affirms that Christianity isn't just an opinion, but is a belief based on facts</u>. The evidence is presented in a way that is fun, memorable, and relatable for elementary age kids.


<u>This material needs to be taught early in a child's life</u>. Most kids who eventually leave the faith in high school or college begin doubting their faith much earlier—some <u>as young as 10 years old</u>. Often our kids are physically still in our homes and church buildings participating in Sunday School, AWANA, and VBS but mentally and spiritually many are doubting what they have been taught and are beginning their exit from Christianity. Introducing kids to the evidence for their faith, through the material that is taught in these lessons will help to remove intellectual barriers and strengthen a child's growing faith. It will also prepare kids to answer objections and resist the lies of Satan they will encounter in an increasingly anti-Christian world, so that they will not get swept away in the culture of confusion.

The five questions that are answered in this curriculum are:

- 1. Is anything really true?
- 2. Is God real?
- 3.Can miracles happen?
- 4.Can I trust the New Testament?
- 5. Is Jesus God, the Savior?

Each of these questions builds on the next to show that Christianity is true. The answers to those five questions are taught over **twelve lessons.** Below are the main points that are taught for each lesson:

- 1. There is Truth
- 2.God is Real Cause of the Universe
- 3.God is Real Designer of the Universe and Life
- 4.God is Real Designer of the Animals and Man (not macroevolution)
- 5.God is Real Moral Lawgiver
- 6. Miracles can happen
- 7. The Copy of the New Testament that we have today is Trustworthy
- 8. The Testimony in the New Testament is Trustworthy
- 9.Jesus is God, the Savior
- 10. The Bible is God's true Word
- 11. You have a Choice to Make about these Truths
- 12. Christianity is True



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
HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

These lessons are written like a script that you can read. Be sure to read the lessons ahead of time to be familiar with the content. It is highly suggested that you prepare by reading the lessons out loud so that you can get an idea of the flow of the material.

You could teach these lessons in one sitting, or teach one key point at a time for short devotions that build on each other. Supplies are listed underneath each key point or the activity for that key point.

For each lesson, students will need to have their Student Workbooks and a pencil to fill in the blanks during the lesson.

Each time you see this symbol in the Teacher's Guide that is a reminder that the students need to fill in a blank in their Student Workbook before continuing.



The word(s) that goes in the blank are **bolded** in the call out box in the script of the Teacher's Guide. The students have a word bank in their workbook to help them know how to spell the key words that go in the blanks in their workbook. Sometimes there is an in-class activity or reading in the Student Workbooks as well; some lessons have an extra activity page that can be done after the lesson or assigned as homework.

Each lesson has a written quiz, as well as a review game with verbal review questions. Each quiz reviews the vocabulary words, key points, and key principles for each lesson. The review game could be played with the class in lieu of, or in preparation for, the written quizzes. The review games may be more appropriate for younger students so that they can give verbal answers to review the material, since the written quizzes require the student to be an independent reader.

Additional Learning Activities are provided in the Teacher's Guide to reinforce various teaching points or to lengthen your teaching time. There is also a list of Extra Learning Resources for students and teachers in the back of each book. Visit CrossExamined.org for much more, including helpful video content.

Each lesson has a set of Key Point Cards in the back of the Student Workbook that the students can cut out. The Key Point Cards are the key points that were taught during the lesson and each point has a matching picture to help the students remember that key point. Students can laminate them and/or punch a hole in the corner and put them on a key ring/chain or tie a piece of string through the cards. You may want to keep each lesson set separate. Or you could have the kids put the Key Point Cards in separate envelopes and label the envelopes for each lesson. Kids can use these flashcards to review the key points during/after your teaching time.

For Lessons 2-5 there is another set of summary cards called "Clue Cards". This is a separate deck of cards that students can cut out and collect as clues to help them remember the parts to the answer for the second question: "Is God Real?". Further instructions for these "Clue Cards" are given in Lessons 2-5. You can refer to the "Key Points and Key Point Cards" chart on pg. 5 for further understanding of the Key Point Cards and Clue Cards.

Our prayer is that through this curriculum your students will begin to be equipped to **know** truth and will believe IN Jesus as their Savior, so that as they get older they will be able to **stand confidently** in the truth of God's Word, as well as have an **answer/defense** against those that would try to dissuade them. VOCABULARY

Lesson 1 - Truth

- Truth Telling what really happened (telling it like it is) or what matches the facts.
- Lie Telling something that is false, did not happen, or does not match the facts.
- Absolute Does not change.
- Relative Changes depending on the situation or someone's opinions instead of something being always right or wrong.
- Observe To pay attention, especially to see or learn something.
- The Rule of Opposites (also known as the Law of Non-contradiction) Opposites cannot both be true and false at the same time, in the same way.
- Self-Defeating To defeat yourself. A self-defeating statement breaks the rule of opposites. It is a statement that is FALSE based on what the sentence is saying.
- Perspective Point of view/opinion.
- Consequence The result of something.

Lesson 2 - God, the Cause

- Special Revelation The Bible; God's special message to mankind. Sometimes it is also called "specific revelation" because it is showing us specific things about God.
- · General Revelation Creation; everyone can see it and know that God is real.
- Universe Everything in space and on the earth; it includes things you can see in nature and things you cannot see. All time, space, and matter (materials) are also included.
- Eternal No beginning or end; uncreated.
- Cause The reason WHY something happened.
- Laws in Science Facts in nature that cannot be changed.
- The Second Law of Thermodynamics or the Law of Entropy The energy in this universe is running out.
- Immaterial Not made out of materials; does not have a body that you can touch.
- Spaceless Not occupying any space; limitless.
- Timeless Always existed (or outside of time).

Lesson 3 – God, the Designer (Pt 1)

- Ridiculous Silly or laughable.
- · Reasonable The answer that makes sense because it comes from good thinking.
- Design Order, details, or planning something.
- Darwinian Evolution The theory that all life forms got here by natural forces without a designer—no God.
- DNA The special code in every cell of every living thing (it's like a software program on your computer).
- · Declare the Glory of God To make known or tell how great God is!
- Presupposition Something you assume to be true.

Lesson 4 - God, the Designer (Pt 2)

- Evolution Change over time
- Macroevolution BIG change over time INTO different animal kinds.
- Kinds Animal families, such as cats, dogs, monkeys.
- Microevolution Small change WITHIN animal kinds.
- Natural selection and Survival of the Fittest Animals pass on characteristics to their babies offspring that help them best survive in their environment. Those that survive are defined as the fittest.
- Fossil The remains of animals or plants that have been turned into rock by quickly getting trapped in mud, wet sand, and water.
- "Missing Links" Fossilized creatures that were supposed be in between one kind and another kind (they were intermediates, or common ancestors between two kinds). All "Missing Links" are still missing.
- Presupposition Something you assume to be true. (Review from Lesson 3)

Lesson 5 – God, the Moral Lawgiver

- · Law A rule that is supposed to tell you what is right or wrong.
- Lawgiver A person, or group of people, who sets the law or rule.
- Moral Right and wrong.
- Moral Laws Things everyone knows that are right or wrong.
- Moral Lawgiver The one who sets the standard, or is the standard, of what is right and wrong (like a
 ruler sets the standard for measuring something); the standard of what is good.
- Heart /Conscience An inner sense you have that tells you what is right and wrong.
- Redeem To bring good out of a bad situation.
- Faith Trusting in what you have good evidence to believe is true.

Lesson 6 - Miracles

- Miracle A rare act of God that is different than what happens in everyday life because it's when God overpowers a natural law. It is a special sign, seal, or stamp confirming that a MESSENGER has come with a special MESSAGE from God.
- Rare Does not happen very often.
- Seal A special sign that a MESSENGER carried a MESSAGE from the king.
- Communicate To talk or tell something.
- General Revelation Something that tells you about God that everyone can see and know.
- Special or Specific Revelation God speaks to people directly, through a special MESSENGER, or through his written Word.
- Repent STOP going the wrong way, and START going the right way.
- Presupposition Something you assume to be true. (Review from Lesson 3)

Lesson 7 – New Testament Manuscripts

- Trustworthy We can rely on it to be true.
- Ancient Old; usually refers to something 1,000 years old or older.
- Manuscript A handwritten copy of a document.
- Reconstruction Something that someone remakes that looks like the original.

Lesson 9 – Jesus

- Savior Someone who rescues someone else from a problem.
- Sin Anything that you think, say, or do that breaks God's Moral Law.
- Cause The reason WHY something happens. (Review from Lesson 2)

Lesson 10 – Bible

 Canon – Standard; the New Testament Canon is the collection of books that are the standard of what should be in the New Testament.

Lesson 12 – Conclusion

- Christianity The belief that Jesus is the Savior.
- Atheists Someone who says that God is not real.

Lesson 8 – New Testament Testimony

- Fiction A made-up story.
- Historical Fiction Stories about real places, specific times in history, or real people, but often the main character(s) are not real and some of the adventures that they go on are made up or cannot be completely verified.
- Non-Fiction Contains information and facts that are true.
- Auto-biography A record about a person's life, like a diary, that they wrote about themselves.
- Biography A book that someone writes reporting the facts about another real person.
- Testimony What someone says about something.
- Eyewitness Someone who saw the events with their own eyes.
- Excruciating Painful.
- Prophecies The promises about Jesus' coming.
- Archelogy The study of things from the past by looking at things like old buildings, coins, household items, and writings carved into stones.

Lesson 11 – Gospel

- Sin Anything that you think, say, or do that breaks God's Moral Law. (Review from Lesson 9)
- Just -Right and good.
- Ransom To give a payment for the release of a prisoner.
- · Believe To trust completely.

LESSON OBJECTIVES

Curriculum Objective: After completing this curriculum students should be able to answer and explain the following main questions: Is Anything Really True? Is God Real? Can Miracles Happen? Can I Trust the New Testament? Is Jesus God, the Savior? Is Christianity True? Students should also be able to understand and explain all the key points for each lesson (found on the Key Point Cards).

AFTER COMPLETING EACH LESSON, STUDENTS SHOULD BE ABLE TO ...

Lesson 1 - Truth

- · Define truth and explain truth based on the seven key points.
- Understand that truth exists, is knowable, and absolute (unchanging).
- Be able to identify self-defeating statements.
- Explain why truth is important for our temporal and eternal lives.
- Explain the answer to this question: "Is Anything Really True?"

Lesson 2 - God, the Cause

- Understand and explain the following outline:
 - 1. Everything that had a beginning had a cause.
 - 2. The universe had a beginning.
 - So the universe had a cause.
- Explain the answers to the following questions:
 - 1. What is the cause of the universe?
 - 2. Can nothing be the cause of the universe?
 - 3. Why does God fit the description of the cause of the universe?
 - 4. Who made God?
- Explain the answer to this question: "Is God Real?" based on the beginning/cause of the universe.

Lesson 3 - God, the Designer (Pt1)

- Understand and explain the following outline:
 - 1. Every design had a designer.
 - 2. The universe and life have design.
 - 3. So there must be a designer.
- Explain why DNA shows that there must be a smart designer.
- State the purpose for the design in the universe and the purpose of man.
- · Explain the answer to this question: "Is God Real?" based on the design in the universe and in life.

Lesson 4 - God, the Designer (Pt2)

- Know the difference between macroevolution and microevolution.
- · State the 4 questions that help someone understand what another person is thinking.
- Give examples that show that macroevolution isn't likely or true.
- Discern that science does not say anything, but scientists do.
- Discern why people can look at the same evidence but come up with different conclusions.
- Explain the answer to this question: "Is God Real?" based on the evidence that a designer is needed to design all the animals just right.

Lesson 5 – God, the Moral Lawgiver

- · Understand and explain the following outline:
 - 1. Every law has a lawgiver.
 - 2. There is a Moral Law.
 - 3. So, there is a Moral Lawgiver.

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- Answer this objection: Since bad things happen, God must not exist.
- Explain the answer to this question: "Is God Real?" based on the Moral Law.
- Remember the 14 clues that have been learned from Lessons 2-5 to explain how we know that God is real based on the universe having a beginning (Lesson 2) and being designed (Lesson 3-4), as well as there being a Moral Law (Lesson 5).

Lesson 6 – Miracles

- Define a miracle.
- · Explain the purpose of a miracle.
- · Name the first miracle that God did and explain why it is the "greatest" display of God's power.
- Understand why people reject miracles.
- Explain the answer to this question: "Can Miracles Happen?"

Lesson 7 - New Testament Manuscripts

- Explain the answer to this question: "Is the copy of the New Testament that we have today the SAME as what the authors first wrote?"
- Describe the process of reconstructing an accurate copy of the original from the available manuscripts.
- Explain why some people still argue that we cannot know what the original New Testament authors
 wrote when the evidence shows we can.
- Explain the answer to this question: "Can I Trust the New Testament?" based on the manuscript evidence for a trustworthy reconstruction.

Lesson 8 - New Testament Testimony

 Explain the answer to this question: "Can I Trust the New Testament?" based on the six types of testimony that the New Testament has that proves its trustworthiness.

Lesson 9 – Jesus

- · Give examples of when Jesus said He is God and the Savior.
- Explain how Jesus showed that He is God.
- Give examples from Isaiah 53 of expected testimony about the promised Savior that Jesus fulfilled.
- Explain how we know that Jesus came back to life again instead of one of the other three possible causes for Jesus' empty tomb.
- Explain the answer to these questions: "Is Jesus God? Is Jesus the Savior?"

Lesson 10 - Bible

- Explain why these three sentences are true:
 - 1. The Bible is God's Word.
 - 2. The Bible cannot be wrong.
 - 3. Anything opposed to the Bible is Wrong.

Lesson 11 – The Gospel

- For the Unsaved To understand the Gospel and have an opportunity to believe in Jesus, the Savior.
- · For the Saved To realize that they should continue to know God and make him known.

Lesson 12 - Conclusion

- Explain and answer the review questions during this lesson, especially surrounding the six main questions: Is Anything Really True?, Is God Real?, Can Miracles Happen?, Can I Trust the New Testament?, Is Jesus God, the Savior?, Is Christianity True?
- · Know five practical steps for going forward with the truth.
